Dear Friends,

As we reflect on the past year, we are again amazed by the commitment and resilience of our community. It has been a year of both challenge and triumph for Second Harvest Food Bank, and our donors, volunteers and partners have helped us to persevere.

The reality is that more and more people in Orange County need the nutritious food we provide. Our ability to meet that need depends on our ability to adapt. In Orange County alone, food insecurity is growing faster than the rest of California and the U.S., driven by the continued high food and fuel prices and expensive housing. An increasing number of children, seniors, families and individuals in our community are relying on us. Despite this challenge, those we serve have received better, fresher and more nutritious food—including protein, produce, eggs and milk—than ever before.

With the growing need comes the opportunity to evolve and improve. Together, our team has continuously innovated to meet the needs of the community, now and in the future, through our:

- Intentional sourcing of nutritious food
- Transition to 100% food delivery to all partners
- Work with our Partner Network to encourage a “choice model,” giving clients the ability to choose nutritious food for themselves that is best for them and their families

- Programs such as Harvest Solutions Farm (our 40-acre partnership with Solutions for Urban Agriculture and the University of California South Coast Research & Extension Center) and Founders Farm
- Implementation of a barcoding inventory system in our Distribution Center to manage food with the highest accuracy and efficiency
- Sustainability efforts, enabling us to be recognized as the first food bank in the country to achieve TRUE (Total Resource Use and Efficiency) certification by the world’s leading sustainability and health certification organization, Green Business Certification Inc.

It takes a community to come together to address hunger. As we look ahead, considering the rapidly increasing needs of our friends and neighbors, we know collaborations will continue to be vital. Though food alone is not the answer to poverty, it is among the most basic of human needs. Without it, there is little individuals can do to lift themselves and their families, economically and otherwise.

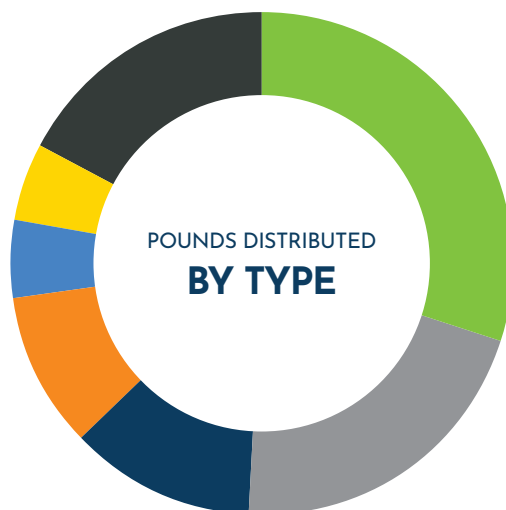

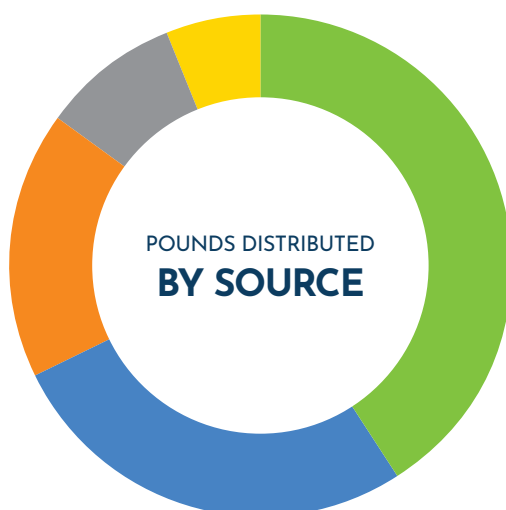
Almost **2.1 million pounds** of nutritious produce, equivalent to 59 truckloads, was harvested at Harvest Solutions Farm.

HOW SCHOOL PANTRIES EASED THE BURDEN OF A MOTHER OF FIVE

A Lifeline for Families: Yvonne M.'s Story

Yvonne, a local mother of five, has found an immense sense of relief through her visits to Eagle's Catch Pantry at Skyview Elementary and Middle School. "It has helped me a lot because this is a year-round school, so my kids come here and it's a big help because they are not going hungry throughout the year," Yvonne says. Access to fresh produce, especially vegetables and fruits, has been a huge support for her family. "The produce is the best because that's more on the expensive side for a family of six, so I appreciate it," she shares.



Yvonne hopes others who need assistance are able to **connect with a pantry near them.**¹ "Food is essential and no kid should be going hungry," she says.

“Thank you for this help because it takes a village to be able to do all of this for the kids... to have this [pantry] at school is a game changer because if my kids are hungry...they can eat. I really appreciate it.”

The Good Market/El Buen Mercado: A New Permanent Food Pantry

In the last fiscal year, Goodwill of Orange County and Second Harvest Food Bank celebrated the opening of a permanent pantry, The Good Market/El Buen Mercado, at Goodwill's Tierney Center for Veteran Services in Tustin.

The Good Market/ El Buen Mercado ensures direct and consistent access to nutritious and quality food for hundreds of employees, program participants and veterans served by Goodwill OC, and as of June 2024, general community members. In January 2024 alone, the pantry supported 954 households, including 3,800 individuals.

We are grateful for the collaboration with Goodwill of Orange County, helping us in our mission to provide dignified, equitable and consistent access to nutritious food for the community.

Volunteers: The Heart and Soul of Our Mission

At Second Harvest Food Bank, our vision is simple yet powerful: An Orange County with food and nutritional security for all. In order to bring this vision to life, we rely on the generous commitment of our volunteers. Volunteers are essential to our ability to deliver nutritious food to our Partner Network day in and day out.

The dedication of our volunteers at Harvest Solutions Farm, Founders Farm and the Distribution Center enables us to provide fresh, nutritious food to those who need

it most. In the past year alone, volunteers contributed an astonishing 65,493 total hours of service. This effort came from 14,334 individual volunteers and 21,277 visits.

At Harvest Solutions Farm, our partnership with Solutions for Urban Agriculture and the University of California South Coast Research & Extension Center, volunteers have harvested over 5.8 million pounds of fresh produce. From summer watermelons to winter cabbages, this nutritious produce is delivered to our pantries and those they serve within a matter of days.

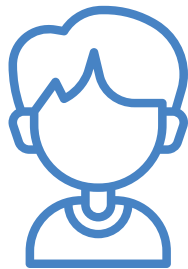


Mapping Hunger: OC's Increased Rate of Food Insecurity is Outpacing the State

Second Harvest is proud to be a part of Feeding America, a nationwide network of food banks with a common goal to help people get the food and resources they need to thrive.¹ Since 2011, Feeding America has produced Map the Meal Gap, a research study that estimates local food insecurity rate and food costs "to improve our understanding of people and places facing hunger...[informing] decisions that will help ensure equitable access to nutritious food for all."

In its latest data, Feeding America shows that there has been a 31.4% increase in food insecurity for children in Orange County – meaning, from 2021 to 2022, the number of children who are food insecure rose from 64K to 84K². For individuals in Orange County, those numbers rose by 23.6%. That's compared to a California-wide increase of 21.5% for children and 19.8% increase for individuals³.

According to Feeding America, key national factors driving food insecurity include unemployment, poverty and income shocks. Additionally, the majority of people facing food insecurity live above the federal poverty line. In Orange County, expensive housing and high food and fuel prices are causing more and more people to rely on Second Harvest and our partners.

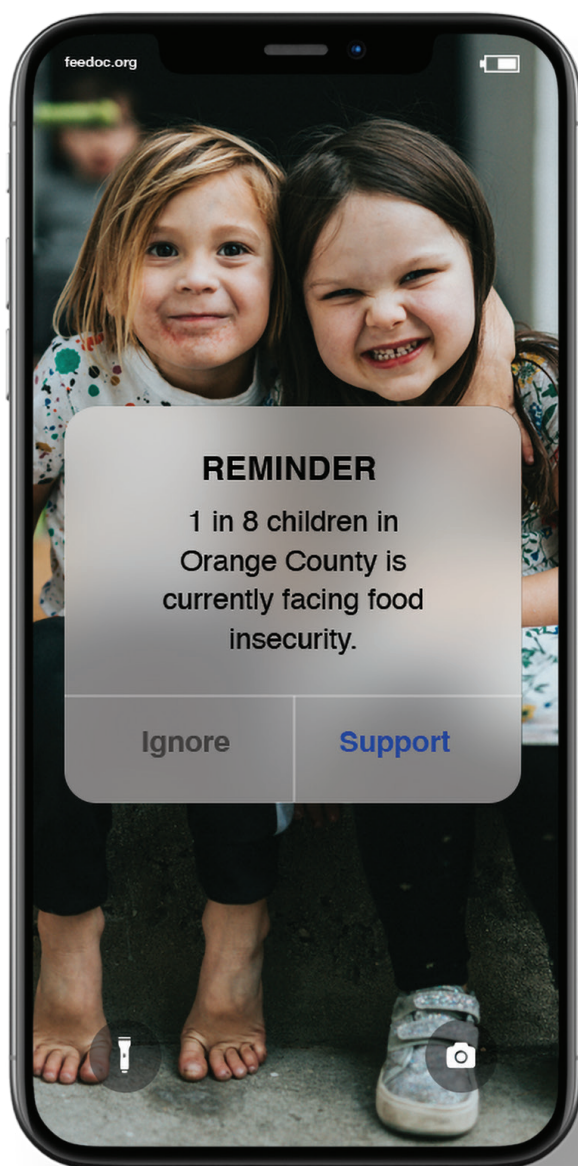

Evolving Forward: Our Three-Year Strategic Plan

As evidenced by Feeding America's Map the Meal Gap data, we know food insecurity in Orange County continues to rise, exceeding pre-pandemic levels. In order to face this growing threat head on, we've devised a three-year strategic plan to address the sobering reality that so many Orange County residents face: That the high cost of living means the impossible choice of paying for things

like rent before groceries is the new normal. Our "45 x '27" plan is to deliver 45 million pounds of food annually to our Partner Network by 2027.

We believe this three-year strategic plan solidifies a future for us where innovation, new ideas and an exciting mindset of boldness will define how we further our mission and improve the lives of those we serve.



The Hidden Hunger Crisis

Food insecurity hides behind the everyday faces and daily interactions with people you might never know are struggling. When it comes to addressing food insecurity in Orange County, one of the biggest factors is awareness. Numbers are on the rise, but it's not always easy to see.

To help get the message out, we created the Hunger Notification campaign. It leverages the value we as a society place on the information we receive through our phones and feeds. These eye-catching ads convey the urgent need facing our community in the visual context of notifications and alerts.

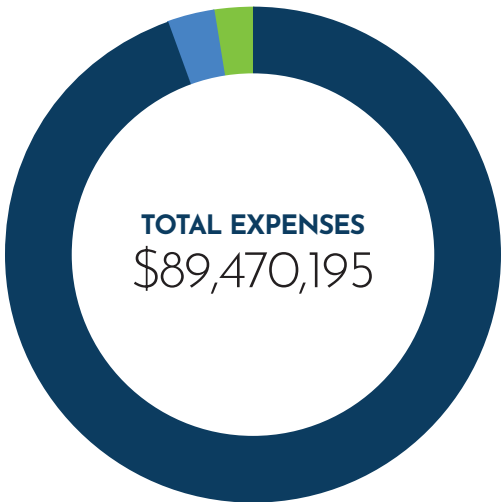
