A LETTER FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends,

This year reminded us why readiness matters. When food need exceeded levels we last saw in 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic, with 529,422 visits to our Partner Network in October 2024 alone, Second Harvest was already prepared. We didn't scramble. We relied on infrastructure we invested in for precisely this.

Your support has helped us build what makes this possible: nutrition-focused sourcing, produce grown in Orange County through our Harvest Solutions Farm and Founder Farms partnerships, 100% delivery to our 286 partners to ensure consistent access to those experiencing food insecurity, and zero-waste operations that reflect careful stewardship. This isn't just a crisis-sparked response. It's strategic capacity.

The reality remains stark. According to Feeding America's *Map The Meal Gap* study, food insecurity in Orange County in 2023 (the most recent data available) has surged by 34.6% since 2021. The high cost of living forces families to choose between rent and groceries. Yet every

person we served this year received better, fresher and more nutritious food than ever before: high-quality protein, produce and milk intentionally sourced to nourish both body and mind. Further, the "choice model" we encourage among our partners empowers community members with the dignity to select nutritious food that is best for their families, reducing waste created by distributing unwanted items.

With over 100 employees and a commitment to impactful collaborations including Harvest Solutions Farm, Founders Farm and as a member of the OC Hunger Alliance, we stand ready as a strategic partner to the one in nine individuals struggling with food insecurity. As we enter year two of our three-year "45 by '27" strategic plan, we are on track to deliver 45 million pounds of nutritious food annually by 2027.

Your support doesn't just feed people today. It builds the resilience and bolsters the means to feed our community tomorrow. Because of you, we are ready for whatever comes next.

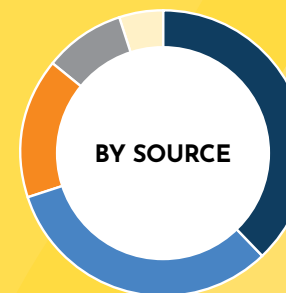
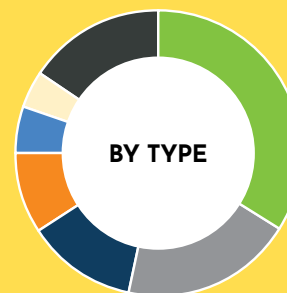

Turning Experience Into Action: Santiago's Story

Santiago grew up the youngest of four children in Santa Ana. His dad worked two jobs, leaving at 6:00am and often returning home at midnight, and mom was at home full-time. "They always found a way to feed our family," he says. "I never saw us as 'struggling' because they protected us from that reality. I thought the way we got food, shopping at budget grocery stores, picking up boxes from food pantries and visiting WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) centers, was normal."

In high school, Santiago played on the school's volleyball team and participated in student government, including serving as senior class president. On days when he was able to take advantage of the school's

free breakfasts, he always ate quickly. He says it wasn't because he was late, but, "Something in me wasn't sure when I'd eat again." Other days, he remembers being hungry in first period and waiting for lunch.

Once in college, when he was approved for CalFresh (food stamps), he reflected on his past and realized that he had lived with food insecurity for much of his childhood. After graduating from college and working in a corporate job for two years, he now works as Outreach Coordinator at a Mariners Church pantry that is a member of Second Harvest's Partner Network. He loves serving his community and he wants to make his parents proud.

"Growing up, I never really thought deeply about food insecurity... or at least not in a way I had the words for. When I got to college, I realized that hunger wasn't a global issue or a chapter in a textbook. It was part of my story and I couldn't ignore it in others. You don't know what people are going through until you hear and know their stories. We cannot solve what we refuse to see."

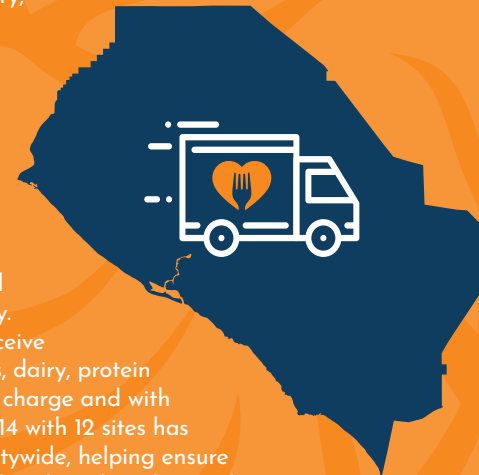

A Decade of Meeting Families Where They Are: Mobile School Pantries

Marking its 10th anniversary, Second Harvest's Mobile School Pantry (MSP) program brings farmer's market-style food distributions directly to school campuses across Orange County, making healthy food conveniently accessible to students, their families and the surrounding community. Each month, thousands receive fresh fruits and vegetables, dairy, protein and pantry staples free of charge and with dignity. What began in 2014 with 12 sites has grown to 76 locations countywide, helping ensure that children are nourished and ready to learn. The MSP program exemplifies how community partnerships meet families where they are, transforming school grounds into hubs of health and hope.

Volunteers: The Hands and Heart of Second Harvest

When need spiked in fiscal year 2024-2025, our volunteer support didn't falter, it grew. That's because we built our operations around the people who show up, day in and day out, ready to meet the moment.

At Harvest Solutions Farm, Founders Farm and the Distribution Center, volunteers enable us to deliver fresh, nutritious food exactly when and where it's needed most. In fiscal year 2024-2025 alone, volunteers contributed 66,771

total hours of service—nearly 25,000 visits from 16,462 individuals who believed in the mission.

At Harvest Solutions Farm, our partnership with Solutions for Urban Agriculture and the University of California South Coast Research & Extension Center, volunteers took to the fields to harvest over two million pounds of fresh produce. From summer zucchini to winter broccoli, this nutritious food reaches our partners and the families they serve within days of harvest.

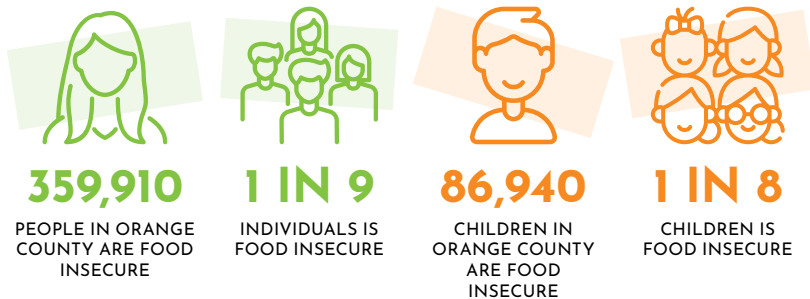

Our Work Addressing Food Insecurity Continues

Feeding America, a nationwide network of 200 food banks of which Second Harvest is a member, released the latest statistics on food insecurity in America. The staggering numbers prove our work continues to be critical for the health and well-being of everyone in Orange County.



Why Need is Skyrocketing in Orange County

Second Harvest is proud to be a part of Feeding America, a nationwide network of food banks with a common goal to help people get the food and resources they need to thrive. Since 2011, Feeding America has produced the *Map The Meal Gap* study, a research study that estimates local food insecurity rates and food costs "to improve our understanding of people and places facing hunger."

In its latest data, Feeding America shows that from 2021 to 2023, Orange County experienced a 34.9% increase in food insecurity for children. This means the number of food-insecure children rose from 64,000 to 87,000. For all individuals in Orange County, food insecurity rose by 34.6%. By comparison, California saw a statewide increase of 20.7% for children and 30.4% for individuals.

According to Feeding America, key national factors driving food insecurity include unemployment, poverty and income shocks. In Orange County, expensive housing combined with high food and fuel prices continue to push more families to rely on Second Harvest and our Partner Network. We built our infrastructure to meet this moment.



The Impossible Choice

In Orange County, the high cost of housing forces a daily struggle. With the average rent nearly \$2,800 a month, families are stretched to their breaking point. For those with the lowest incomes, the situation is dire: 82% of these households spend over half their income just to keep a roof over their heads.¹

In these circumstances, nutritious food becomes a luxury. Families skip meals, stretch food further or turn to less healthy options because that's what they can afford—if they can afford food at all. Second Harvest exists because too many of our community members are forced to choose between keeping a roof overhead and putting food on the table. Through our Partner Network, we ensure that no one has to make that impossible choice alone.

The cost of living isn't going down. But our commitment to meeting this moment isn't wavering either.



Building Capacity to Meet the Growing Need

In FY24, we launched a three-year strategic plan to deliver 45 million pounds of nutritious food annually to our Partner Network by 2027. This “45 by ‘27” plan ensures we’re not just responding to crisis, but building sustained capacity.

Year 1: Exceeding Expectations

Our FY25 goal was 39 million pounds. We delivered 42.1 million pounds, surpassing our FY26/year 2 target ahead of schedule. This success reflects intentional sourcing, strengthened partnerships and operational excellence that keeps us ready for whatever comes next.

The financials presented are pre-final audit. In accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), the value of donated food and professional services is recognized as in-kind revenue and in-kind expense. For FY2025, the ending balance of donated food inventory was lower than in FY2024, resulting in an adjusted increase in total expenses for the year. Excluding the in-kind adjustment, net revenue totaled approximately \$148,000.

A National Leader in Sustainability

The Food Bank was awarded a third year of TRUE certification for zero waste by Green Business Certification Inc., indicating a waste diversion rate of 94.2% (e.g., less than 6% of what Second Harvest's operations produce, in terms of unused materials, go to a landfill). This distinction makes Second Harvest the only food bank in the world to achieve this level of certification, highlighting our leadership in sustainable, zero-waste operations.



Highest-Ever Food Safety Score

Second Harvest received its highest cumulative score ever on the annual American Institute of Baking (AIB) audit—a near-perfect 995 out of 1000. This achievement demonstrates our unwavering commitment to food safety and operational excellence, ensuring we are always ready to serve our community with precision and care.
